SUMMARY OF AREAS OF EXPERTISE

PROGRAM EVALUATION AND RESEARCH. Since 1999, I have evaluated community-based programs comprised of diverse social, health, and educational initiatives. Subject matters and settings I am most experienced in evaluating include teen pregnancy prevention interventions, HIV/AIDS prevention education curricula implementation, treatment court/diversion programs, substance abuse treatment settings for women, homeless healthcare programs, and youth prevention and intervention programs. I also work with organizations to build program evaluation capacity utilizing the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention's (CDC) recommended evaluation framework, as well as community-based participatory research (CBPR) to include multiple stakeholders in the evaluation process. Specifically, I am developing practical models of CBPR as a way to replicate best practices for engaging community members in complex and dynamic research methods. First, the "FAST" model is being tested as a model for engaging young people in CBPR. In addition, while serving as a post-doctoral fellow at Johns Hopkins School of Public Health, I conceptualized the "WELL-BEING" model for engaging community-based researchers and advocates in obesity reduction prevention and interventions opportunities.

SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH INTERVENTION DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION. My work in program evaluation and research often leads to findings and implications for new intervention development. As such, I have developed two HIV prevention programs based on the findings from my doctoral research. First, the GEMS program (Girls Empowered and Motivated to Succeed) integrates self-esteem building and problem solving skills into an HIV prevention curriculum for adolescent girls of color. Next, the RISE program (Reaching and Intervening with Survivors Effectively) focuses on HIV prevention and intervention for women survivors of violence, substance abuse, and homelessness. Both programs currently are funded through the Department of Health and Human Services' Office on Women's Health (OWH).

ORGANIZATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS AND CAPACITY BUILDING. In collaboration with community-based organizations, I have developed workshops to enhance organizational and program capacity. Areas of expertise include program management, evaluation capacity building, leadership development, enhanced communications and teamwork, and organizational needs assessment. In addition, I use principles of "edu-tainment" to motivate and engage front-line staff in technical skills-building and personal growth and development.

PUBLIC HEALTH SUBJECT MATTER EXPERTISE. As a sociologist, I am interested in addressing the social determinants of health for women and girls of color. My work in this area focuses on advancing black feminist theoretical perspectives

as a gender specific strategy for intervention development, implementation, and evaluation. Specific areas of concentration include adolescent girls comprehensive health and development, HIV prevention and intervention, pregnant and parenting adolescents, teen pregnancy prevention, substance abuse treatment and after care, and violence against women prevention.
